| Course Overview | This course introduces students to the shifting and volatile landscape of world politics in the 21st century. We'll begin by exploring core concepts and theories and start by examining globalization and its impact on the current world order. Next, we will examine the emergence of the modern international system through key events and case studies of the 20th century, including major wars and the dissolution of empires. We will analyze the transition from the Cold War and its aftermath to a new world order marked by the rise of Asia and powerful nations like the BRICS. Through this lens, we will examine the evolving concept of war and explore alternative security paradigms beyond traditional approaches. The course also explores other critical contemporary issues, tackling challenges like environmental degradation, forced migration, violent extremism, and the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, along with global efforts to address them. Finally, we will engage in critical discussions surrounding human rights and humanitarian interventions and we will conclude by exploring a range of world politics theories, from liberal internationalism to postcolonial and poststructuralist perspectives. | | | | | |
| Course Objectives | This course aims to equip students with a deep and nuanced understanding of the dynamics shaping world politics. By examining a variety of topics, from the genesis of the modern international order to the current global security challenges, students will develop the ability to critically analyze and contribute to current debates on complex global issues. Students will gain a well-rounded perspective that enables them to address the most pressing issues of our time with knowledge rooted both in historical context and contemporary theories.
